Why do we have leap years?

A leap year, where an extra day is added to the end of February every four years, is down to the solar system's disparity with the Gregorian calendar.

A complete orbit of the earth around the sun takes exactly 365.2422 days to complete, but the Gregorian calendar uses 365 days.

Clarification required and given:

As the school Principal I face some interesting and challenging situations at school. Recently we have been advising parents to ensure children at at school no earlier than 8.30am due to supervision issues while staff are still preparing the day. We have also asked that when the playground is cleared we do not want to see children back at school until 3.30pm and they must be changed so we can be assured they have been home.

The delicate and concerning issue is those families arriving late, and on time, then remaining at school for a catch up with friends and family. This is welcomed and encouraged, because the school is a meeting place for families, but we want to be <u>very clear</u> that if you have arrived at school to collect your children then they are clearly in **your** care and they are **your responsibility**.

We have had a few incidents after school over the last few months and one resulted in an injury on the trampoline that will see new mats being made and attached. The other involved an altercation between two children while parents chatted and the incident required intervention from staff. This is a difficult situation because clearly the children are in the care of their parents but the incident happened on the school grounds and it appears it was not seen or heard by parents who were only 5-10 metres away from the incident.

Parenting is a privilege and a challenge from time to time. Children are children and they get into disagreements and require teaching and guidance on how to solve these issues without being physical with each other. We also work really hard to ensure children treat each other with respect and do not engage in bullyish behaviour.

We ask that you support this by taking responsibility of your children quickly if you arrive at school. If you are going to be late then make sure you have called the office and the staff will make arrangements to keep your children safe.

In simple terms:

- Actively supervise your children at 3pm pick up! This means keep them in sight, keep them safe and intervene if there are disagreements. It is <u>your</u> responsibility at that time and not the staff's responsibility.
- While on school grounds children are expected to behave in a way that is acceptable to the normal school day. Work together, do your best and use your manners!
- If your child is identified as being troublesome or unsupervised after school then we will be asking for you to clear the grounds within 5 minutes of pickup so incidents do not occur or a waiting point will be identified for your children until you arrive.
