**Volunteer Pool Person required** - We are on the lookout for a new Pool manager. Paul Counsel has had a change of circumstances with work and will not be available to support the school as much as last year. We would like any interested people to contact Mark in the school office. Your role would involve chemical handling and testing of the pool and we will train you with this. It may involve a course in Christchurch that we would pay for. We desperately want to keep the school pool going and will not be able to do this without a volunteer manager.

The bus will leave school at 7am sharp and will be back for 2.30 as staff have meetings from 4 pm that day.

We have them back again - What are head lice? Head lice are small flat insects, about 2–3 mm long. They live on the scalp (the skin on a person's head where the hair grows from). Head lice lay their eggs (nits) on strands of hair.

**Anyone can get head lice** – it doesn't matter how clean or dirty a person's hair is. Head lice spread by crawling from one person's hair to another's – usually between people who are in close contact, such as family or school classmates.

Head lice:cannot jump, fly or swim,do not carry disease, stay on the scalp after swimming or bathing/showering.

Eggs (nits) - Female head lice lay about 7–10 eggs each night. The eggs are small and hard (like a grain of salt) and are normally pale grey in colour. Eggs are laid close to the scalp and are normally pale grey in colour and are firmly glued to strands of hair. After hatching, the empty egg cases are white.

Eggs hatch in 9 days, and head lice live for 40 days. We have some treatments available in the school office supplied by Kidscan. These are available to support the treatment if you see head lice in your child's hair. There is also a new product called **nit-enz** available at Methven and Leeston Pharmacy so we should see that in the Rakaia Pharmacy store soon.
